- Please walk the dog off-site, suggested local dog walks below.
- Please clear up any dog mess.

If your dog gets wet and muddy, something I know well with a spaniel, there is a hose pipe outside the Farmhouse, please do your best to clean them up before they go into the cottage.

### Useful Contacts:

**Pet Shop**- There is a pet shop on Pickering high street which has most pet supplies, on Monday there is a pet supply stall on the market. For good value feed try George Magsons Feed supplies on Southgate Pickering.

### Places that you can take dogs with you:

Here are a few we know of, if you find any others please let us know:

The **Fox and Rabbit** pub on the road to Whitby does a selection of reasonably priced bar meals.

The **Horseshoe Inn at Levisham** does excellent food and a great pint of Black Sheep.

The **New Inn at Cropton**, between about 5 miles from Pickering, on the road towards Helmsley and turn off to Rosedale through Wrelton. It has its own brewery – beware the ale is VERY strong.

The **Lion Inn at Blakey** is out on the Moors about six miles from Hutton-le-hole.

The **Buck Inn in Thornton le Dale** its right in the centre of the village allows dogs in the back bar area.

**The Kings Head and the George and Dragon Hotels** both welcomes dogs and are along the main street in Kirkbymoorside.

**The Blacksmiths Arms in Hartoft** it's on the road on the way into Rosedale.

**The White Swan Hotel in Pickering**, on the main Pickering high street allows dogs at lunchtime when there is a bar menu available, a bit more upmarket than some pub food but very good. We have sample menus for most of these pubs in the office and can give more detailed directions.

### Attractions and places to visit

The Ryedale attractions guide that is in your tourist information file has a dog welcome symbol against the local attractions that you are able to take dogs into.

### Beaches that allow dogs

Dogs are allowed on all the beaches from 1<sup>st</sup> October until 30<sup>th</sup> April. Outside these times the following beaches permit dogs as long as you "clean up" after them.



## SCARBOROUGH

North Bay-from the corner complex, south towards the castle.

South Bay-from the Spa Complex, south.

## FILEY

From the Lifeboat station, North to Brigg

From beyond beach chalets, South

## WHITBY

From the beach chalets, north to first set of beach houses at Sandsend.

## ROBIN HOODS BAY

Great Beach!!!

## Walks From Eastgate Without the Car

From the cottages walk out of the back entrance, where you drive in, do not cross the road, and turn right towards the BP garage, go straight across the main road, then turn left into Mill Lane, past the sports field then at the last house you will see a bridle path off to the left. Follow the bridle path across the field you will come to some cottages by the side of the road, either turn around and come back or follow the road back. Total; walk 20-30mins

A slightly longer walk (or take the car to Ruffa Lane). If walking, walk along Eastgate away from town, turn left up Eastfield Road, at the post box. At the top turn right on Ruffa Lane, after about 100yds, the road ends and there is a lane off the left hand side of the road. The lane is fenced both sides and goes on for a couple of miles to some woods, a great walk that you can let the dog off the lead. Come back the same way to avoid walking along Whitby Road.

## Walking on the Moors – A warning

The Moors are great for walking dogs they can have a great run around as long as they don't chase sheep and you should be particularly careful around lambing time.

One thing you must check for is sheep ticks, they attach themselves to the dog (or sometimes you) when walking through the bracken. They are small and round and suck blood, be very careful when removing them as if you don't get them out in their entirety then they can grow under the skin. If you have nails then get hold and pull quickly or clip them in half and they will die and drop off. Do check your dog carefully especially long haired one – they seem to be around between April and September.

Be a responsible dog owner and follow the countryside code.
